IB has always championed a stance of critical engagement with challenging ideas, one that values the progressive thinking of the past while remaining open to future innovation. It reflects the IB's commitment to creating a collaborative, global community united by a mission to make a better world through education.

The IB Diploma Programme

The IB Diploma Programme (IBDP) is an academically challenging and balanced pre-university programme with final examinations that prepares students, aged 16-19, for success at university and life beyond. It has been designed to address the intellectual, social, emotional and physical well-being of students. The programme has gained recognition and respect from the world's leading universities. The IBDP prepares students for effective participation in a rapidly evolving and increasingly global society as they:

- develop physically, intellectually, emotionally and ethically
- acquire breadth and depth of knowledge and understanding, studying courses from six subject groups
- develop the skills and a positive attitude towards learning that will prepare them for higher education
- study at least two languages and increase understanding of cultures, including their own
- make connections across traditional academic disciplines and explores the nature of knowledge through the programme's unique theory of knowledge course
- undertake in-depth research into an area of interest through the lenses of one or more academic disciplines in the extended essay
- enhance their personal and interpersonal development through creativity, action and service

IB Diploma Programme Curriculum

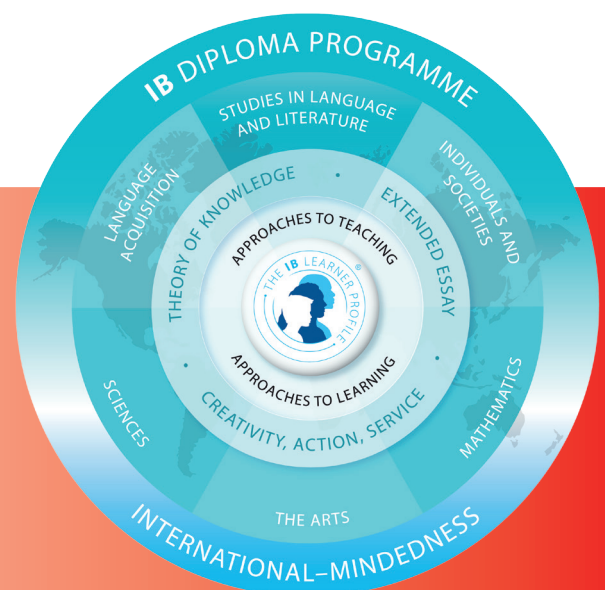
IBDP students must choose one subject from each of the five groups (1 to 5), ensuring breadth of knowledge and understanding in English, additional language(s), the social sciences, the experimental sciences and mathematics. Students must also choose either an arts subject from group 6, or a second subject from groups 1 to 5.

IBDP subjects can be taken at higher level or standard level. At least three and not more than four subjects are taken at higher level (240 teaching hours). Students can study and take examinations, in English, French or Spanish.

- **Group 1:** Studies in Language & Literature
- **Group 2:** Language Acquisition
- **Group 3:** Individuals and Societies
- **Group 4:** Sciences
- **Group 5:** Mathematics
- **Group 6:** The Arts

Additionally, all IB students must complete the following:

- **THEORY OF KNOWLEDGE (TOK)** - an interdisciplinary subject at the core of the IB DP; designed to stimulate critical awareness of bases of knowledge, experience and judgement in human thought and creativity.
- **EXTENDED ESSAY (EE)** – requirement to research, write, and submit for external evaluation a 4,000-word essay on a topic of interest from within the IB curriculum; usually taken from one of their higher level subjects.
- **CREATIVITY, ACTION, SERVICE (CAS)** - students must demonstrate a continuous engagement in extra-curricular, evenly balanced between creative, athletic and community service activities.



IB Diploma Programme @ SIS

Sunway International School (SIS) has launched the IB Diploma Programme (IBDP) in **January 2017** as an additional universities pathway for students. It is the world's fastest growing university preparation programme over the past decade and is currently one of the most widely recognised qualifications for admission into the world's top tiered university.

The strength of the IBDP will be enhanced at SIS by the highly-trained and dedicated Canadian certified teachers that will also be teaching our IB courses. Their knowledge and experience will be a key ingredient to the success of the program as it has been with our Ontario curriculum. Having an incredibly strong base of teachers places us at a distinct advantage in terms of launching and offering the programme.

Similar to the Ontario programme, IBDP has a community service focus, a second language requirement and a Theory of Knowledge (TOK) component that requires students to reflect not only on what they learn but how they learn.

The IBDP is a programme that forces students to not only defend their own perspective, but also to consider and empathize with diametrically opposed points of view. Students will continually engage in a process of discovery learning where they internalise and "make their own sense" of concepts and content.

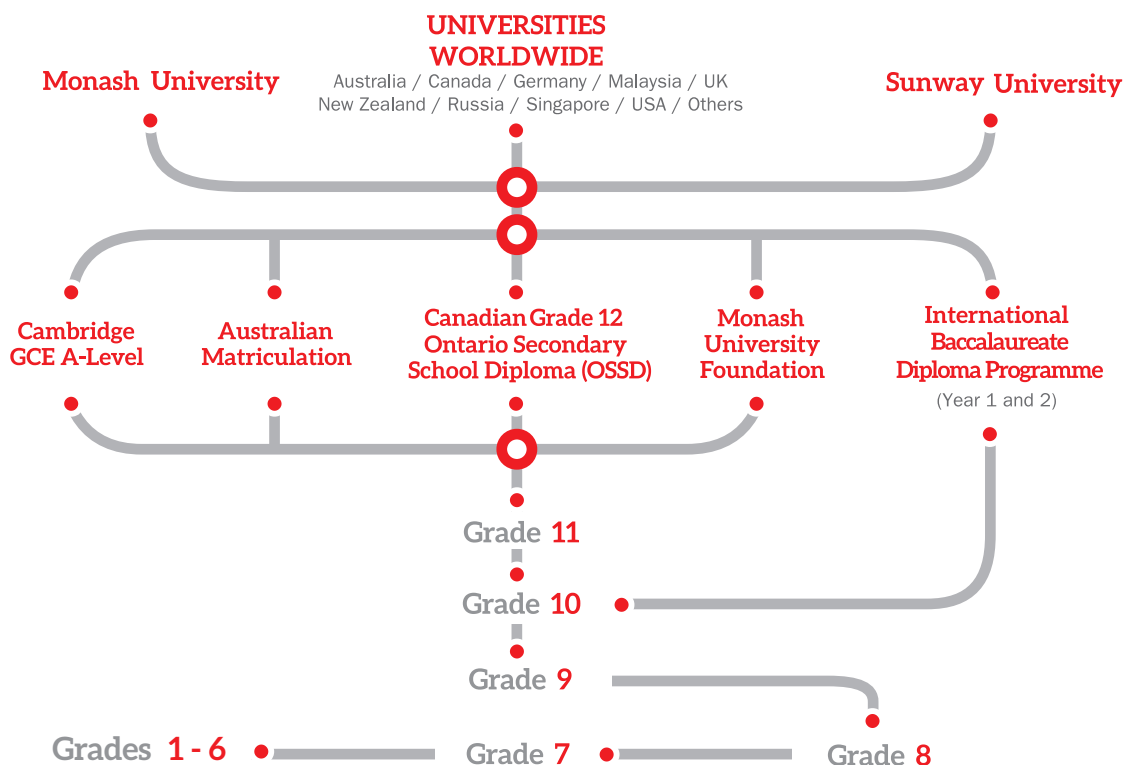
